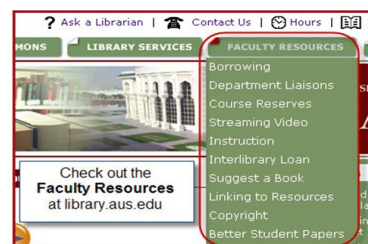
Do students know about the RHD?



In Spring 2010 we conducted a brief survey of students to find out if they were aware of the library's "Ask A Librarian" service and the Research Help Desk (RHD) and to determine their preferences for interacting with librarians. A whopping 83% of the 200 students surveyed said they prefer face-to-face interactions with a librarian – email correspondence rated second highest at only 10%!
